Higher Music

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Course Outline

As with other NQ Music courses, the Higher course is divided into three units: Performing Skills, Composing Skills and Understanding Music.

Performing Skills: Pupils practise on 2 instruments (or 1 instrument and voice) during the course of the year. On designated dates, pupils will record their work and evaluate their progress. This unit provides valuable preparation for the Performance Exam – a course assessment where pupils perform a programme lasting 12 minutes to a visiting examiner in February/March. This makes up 60% of the final grade for Music.

There will be a formal prelim in late November/early December, to track and assess progress.

Composing Skills: Pupils analyse the work of various composers, in different styles. Using what they have learned, pupils create a number of their own compositions. These may imitate the style of a particular composer, or may be pieces of original work. All compositions will contain a number of Higher level concepts. On completion of their work, pupils will evaluate the composition process, and their completed pieces. This is a unit assessment, and is assessed internally.

Understanding Music: Pupils listen to, research, analyse and discuss music from a variety of different styles, from the 1600's to the present day. Assessment may be in the form of end-of-unit tests, presentations and discussion. The course assessment takes the form of a Listening paper during the main exam diet in May. This makes up 40% of the final grade in Music.

Exam Preparation

Performing: Pupils are expected to undertake at least 2 hours of practice per week on their chosen instruments. Some class time will be allocated for this purpose, but pupils should also set aside time to practise at home, or during interval/lunch/study periods at school if required.

Understanding Music: Pupils should regularly revise new concepts introduced in class, and listen to new styles of music.
